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PURPOSE

Of Seal and Branding Guidelines

This guide has been created to define the official version of the Tarrant County seal and a visual representation of its brand. Approved for use by the Commissioners Court, this guide was created and will be implemented by the Tarrant County Administrator's office. It is to be used as a reference guide for the official Tarrant County seal and its proper use.

The guidelines, definitions and examples of county seal usage shall be followed by all Tarrant County departments, their employees, and elected officials. Failure to do so is a misrepresentation of the authority of the county seal.

HISTORY

Of The Tarrant County Seal

The Tarrant County seal is based on the design of the Texas state seal of 1895. The state seal contains a lone star encircled by traditional symbols of strength (a live oak branch) and peace (an olive branch). A balance of these traits is required for a community to thrive, which is why they are tied together by a scarlet ribbon. These values are upheld by a community dedicated to sacrifice and unity.

County Seal

COUNTY Seal

Any seal designs currently in use that do not exactly match the official seal are unofficial representations of the county seal, and must be changed.

Before ordering new printed materials, any printed items displaying previous versions of the Tarrant County seal must be used.

Any new digital or printed items ordered or created must use official seal.



EXCLUSION ZONE

To protect seal visibility, there must always be minimum space around the outside border of the county seal. No other elements can be within this invisible boundary. The Texas star from the center of the seal is used as the guide for the required minimum space around the outside of the seal. A whole star is used as a guide for minimum distance of design elements. A half star is used as a guide for text elements.



The smallest size the county seal can be, is shown to the left. The minimum dimensions are either 0.50 x 0.50 inch or 48 px x 48 px. If smaller dimensions than these are used, the seal becomes unreadable.

SEAL

Do not change the appearance or color of the Tarrant County seal.

The following are examples of misuse of the seal.

MISUSE



DO NOT change the font.



DO NOT change the position of the outer ring.



DO NOT REMOVE elements from the seal.



DO NOT change spacing of elements in the seal.



DO NOT squash or warp the seal.



DO NOT change the color of any element of the seal.



DO NOT ADD elements to the seal.

DO NOT ADD your name or department name to the seal.

SECONDARY Seal Colors

County Color Palettes

PRIMARY **Color Palette**

The Tarrant County primary color palette is based on colors used throughout the Tarrant County historic courthouse, the state capital and the Texas flag.

Colors within the primary color palette are to be used as the main and/or accent colors for branding and marketing efforts.

Colors used outside of the primary or secondary color palettes are off brand and cannot be used without permission from the County Administrator's office.



Primary Colors Codes

In order to keep consistent and accurate color between digital and print media, design content within RGB color space. Use HEX or RGB color codes when creating and designing materials. Only use CMYK or Pantone color codes if print shop or vendor specifically asks for those codes.


Tints

Tints may be used when a lighter version is needed to have an appropriate contrast between text or image.

Each tint of the primary colors is 20% lighter.






Secondary Tints

Tints may be used when a lighter version of a secondary color is needed to have an appropriate contrast between text or image. Each secondary tint color is 20% lighter.




Color Palette Examples

Color contrast is the difference in light between a font or other element in the foreground and background.

Proper color contrast
between text and design
elements improves the
legibility of designs.
Creating contrast makes
designs accessible to
those with color blindness,
low vision, low contrast
sensitivity, or other visual
disabilities.





Complimentary Colors

The following are examples of complimentary color combinations of the primary and secondary color palettes. This is not an all-inclusive list, multiple complimentary colors may be used when appropriate.

Any complimentary colors combined as text and background must pass visual accessibility requirements.



Visual Accessible Complimentary Colors

These complimentary color combinations of the primary and secondary palettes may be used together as text and background color. These tints and colors meet the requirements for visual accessibility.

Fonts

FONTS

The following fonts have been chosen because of their legibility, accessibility, and timelessness.

Tarrant County's primary font is Arial. Arial is the most accessible typeface for communications, publications, and works best with translations in multiple languages.

Georgia and Times New Roman are serif fonts for use in formal and official communications.

All of the subtypes for each font may be used in the correct capacity, as displayed in the three categories to the right.



DEPARTMENT

Usage

When using the county seal with a department name, the department name must be outside of the seal. The font style for department usage must be Arial Bold. Text can be large or small, but it must always be legible.

The Texas star from the center of the seal is used as the guide for the required minimum space around the outside perimeter of the seal. Depending on design, a half star or whole star may be used as a guide for appropriate spacing between county seal and text. See right and below for examples of correct spacing and usage.

Centered



The Texas star from the center of the seal is used as the guide for the required minimum space around the outside of the seal. Half or whole star may be used as a guide depending on design.



Left Aligned





When using a department name within a department, the top font must be Arial Bold and the bottom font must be Arial Regular.

To aid in the effort to display uniformity county wide, the following are examples of appropriate seal usage by Tarrant County departments.

Note:

Departments are not authorized to use the full color seal as a profile image on digital platforms. To avoid confusion, the color seal is reserved for the primary official Tarrant County digital platforms. Departments with digital platforms may use the county seal in a secondary color with transparent background. Please see the example below created by Tarrant County Public Health, and refer to page 9 for secondary seal color options.







When using the county seal with an elected official's name, the name, title, and department should be centered or left aligned to the seal. The Texas star from the center of the seal is used as the guide for the required minimum space around the outside perimeter of the seal.

Depending on design, a half star or whole star may be used as a guide for appropriate spacing between county seal and text. See right and below for examples of correct spacing and usage.



TARRANT EMBLEM

The Tarrant County emblem is based on designs from the 1895 courthouse. The simplicity of the design will allow for ease of use on communication and outreach materials.

The Tarrant County emblem may be used in any of the colors from the primary color palette.

TC LOGO







The TC logo, pictured above, was rediscovered by architect Ward Bogard during the 1982 restoration of the 1895 courthouse. Bogard incorporated the TC logo in the design of the doorknobs and tiled floors of the courthouse. The TC logo may be used in conjunction with the Tarrant County seal.

When appropriate, the TC logo can be displayed using any of the primary palette colors.

Business Grant Eligibility

- Must qualify as an Impacted Industry as defined by the U.S. Treasury and adopted by Commissioners Court.
- □ Must be physically located and operating in Tarrant County since 1/1/2020.
- Must have had 50 or fewer employees as reported on 1st Quarter 2020 Form 941.
- Owners of multiple businesses are only eligible to apply for ONE business. All owners must be disclosed within the application.
- ☐ Grant amounts up to \$27,500 for qualifying non-profit and for-profit businesses
- □ Deadline to apply August 31, 2022 at 5 p.m. or until funds are depleted.

Vendor Registration

- Vendor Information Needed To Register:
 Company Data- Business name, business address, business Tax ID (TIN/EIN), phone, fax, email and primary contact information.
 - NIGP Codes- Commodity codes to receive upcoming bid notifications, requests for proposals or quotations, specifications and other related correspondence from Tarrant County Purchasing Department.
- Company User and Contact Information- Primary contact and any additional users authorized by the business to log in and make changes to company or contact data.
- o Certifications- HUB /MBE / DBE / SBA / WBC are certifications currently accepted by Tarrant County. Tarrant County accepts certifications from other states and cities.

REFERENCES

Legal use of the State Seal of Texas

The state seal is required by law to be affixed to numerous documents, such as commissions for elected and appointed state and local officials; patents for land from the state; executive acts of the governor in criminal cases such as remissions of fines, reprieves, commutations of punishment, extraditions, and pardons; state bonds; and all official documents issued from the office of the secretary of state. The state arms and reverse of the state seal are used exclusively as symbols of the state and do not have any independent legal significance.

Private use of the state seal, including the state arms and reverse of the state seal, is regulated by law. The state seal may be used for commercial purposes only if a license is obtained from the secretary of state and royalties are paid to the state. Persons seeking more information on private use of the state seal should contact the office of the secretary of state. Additionally, it is a criminal offense for a person other than a political officeholder knowingly to use a representation of the state seal in political advertising.

History of the State Seal of Texas

Texas Secretary of State - What is a Seal?

"A seal serves to identify, like a signature, an individual or organization and to authenticate written material from that individual or organization. Historically a seal established the authenticity of a document, just as a signature does today. Currently, when both a seal and a signature appear together on a document, the seal authenticates or verifies the signature."

Texas Secretary of State w- Senator Oliver Jones' Committee Report

"...the Committee are convinced of the necessity of adopting a Separate and Distinct Standard and Seal arms for this Republic, by so improving and embellishing the present as to fortify the Single Star with an olive and live oak branches. being emblems of Peace, and of the Materials of our strong arm of national defense in War, and indigenous to our Soil. Also the flag as proposed by the act, emblematic of Peace, & friendship, or War."
